

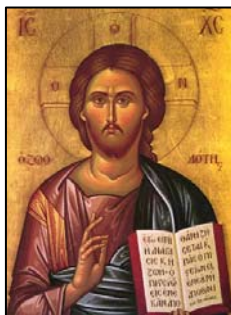

Liturgical Guide for Sunday, April 11, 2010

ON THIS DAY, THE 2ND SUNDAY OF PASCHA, WHICH WE REFER TO AS ANTIPASCHA – THE SUNDAY OF ST. THOMAS, WE COMMEMORATE THE CONFIRMATION OF THE RESURRECTION OF CHRIST, ON THE OCCASION OF THE DOUBT OF THOMAS CHANGING INTO A PROFESSION OF FAITH. HIS AUDACITY IS STRESSED TOGETHER WITH THE INFINITE KINDNESS OF CHRIST WHO GAVE HIM THE MOST STRIKING PROOFS. THE SPIRITUAL CLOSENESS OF JOHN IS COMMEMORATED TOGETHER WITH THE PHYSICAL CLOSENESS OF THOMAS. ON THIS DAY WE ALSO COMMEMORATE Holy Priest-Martyr Antipas, Bishop of Pergamon (+92); Righteous Tryphaine of Kyzikos; Righteous Father Pharmuthios the Anchorite; Martyrs Processos and Martinian (beheaded with St. Paul – 1st cent.). *Through their holy intercessions, O God, have mercy on us and save us. Amen.*

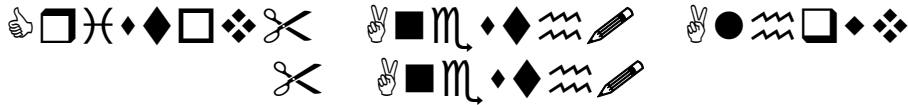
Welcome, Visitors and Newcomers, to our Mission Parish!

SPECIAL HYMNS SUNG BEFORE/AFTER SMALL ENTRANCE

1./4. Hymn for Sunday of St. Thomas – (Hymnal-pp.154-157):

Sung after the Great Doxology and after the Small Entrance: While the tomb was sealed, You shone forth from it as light, O our life, Christ our God. And though the doors were closed, You appeared in the midst of Your disciples. O Resurrection of all, through them restore in us a new spirit in Your great mercy.

2./8. Special Hymn for the Feast of Pascha (our Lord's passover from death to life):

Sung three times after the opening of the Divine Liturgy, before the Small Entrance, and after the distribution of Holy Communion: Christ is risen from the dead. By death, He has trampled Death; and to those in the tombs, He has granted life.

3. Small Entrance Exclamation of the Priest:

On the occasion of the Feast of Pascha, the Priest intones the following at the Small Entrance: "In your choirs, bless the Lord, you of Israel's wellspring. Save us, O Son of God, who did rise from the dead, we sing to You: Alleluia!"

5. Kontakion for Pascha – (Hymnal-pp.274-277):

Sung after the Small Entrance: Into the grave You descended, Immortal One, yet You destroyed the power of Hades, and as victor You arose, O Christ our God; You proclaimed to the myrrh-bearing women a greeting of joy, You

brought peace to Your holy apostles, and to the fallen You granted resurrection.

6. Megalynarion (Hymn to the Theotokos) – (Hymnal-pp.308-309):

Today , the following hymn is sung instead of "Axion Estin" or "Truly it is proper to call you blessed...": “You are the shining light and the Mother of God, of incomparable glory and higher in dignity than all creatures; with songs of praise we magnify you.”

7. Communion Hymn – (Hymnal-pp.320):

On the occasion of today’s feast, the following hymn is sung instead of “Aineite” or “Praise the Lord...”: “Exalt in the Lord, O Jerusalem; praise your God, O Zion. Alleluia.” (Ps. 147[147B])

Gospel Reading During Orthros Service (Matthew 28:16-20)

Now the eleven disciples went to Galilee, to the mountain to which Jesus had directed them. When they saw Him, they worshiped Him; but some doubted. And Jesus came and said to them, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to Me. Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you. And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age."

Epistle Reading (Acts 5:12-20)

Now many signs and wonders were done among the people through the apostles. And they were all together in Solomon’s Portico. None of the rest dared to join them, but the people held them in high esteem. Yet more than ever believers were added to the Lord, great numbers of both men and women, so that they even carried out the sick into the streets, and laid them on cots and mats, in order that Peter’s shadow might fall on some of them as he came by. A great number of people would also gather from the towns around Jerusalem, bringing the sick and those tormented by unclean spirits, and they were all cured. Then the high priest took action; he and all who were with him (that is, the sect of the Sadducees), being filled with jealousy, arrested the apostles and put them in the public prison. But during the night an angel of the Lord opened the prison doors, brought them out, and said, “Go, stand in the temple and tell the people the whole message about this life.”

Gospel Reading (John 20:19-31)

When it was evening on that day, the first day of the week, and the doors of the house where the disciples had met were locked for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." After He had said this, He showed them His hands and His side. Then the disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord. Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you." When He had said this, He breathed on them and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained." But Thomas (who was called the Twin), one of the twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. So the other disciples told him, "We have seen the Lord." But he said to them, "Unless I see the mark of the nails in His hands, and put my finger in the mark of the nails and my hand in His side, I will not believe." A week later His disciples were again in the house, and Thomas was with them. Although the doors were shut, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." Then He said to Thomas, "Put your finger here and see My hands. Reach out your hand and put it in My side. Do not doubt but believe." Thomas answered Him, "My Lord and my God!" Jesus said to him, "Have you believed because you have seen Me? Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe." Now Jesus did many other signs in the presence of His disciples, which are not written in this book. But these are written so that you may come to believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that through believing you may have life in His name.

THIS WEEK'S MEMORY VERSE (TRY TO COMMIT TO MEMORY):

French: Le Christ est Resurrecté! En Verite, il est Resurrecté!

Greek: Christos Anesti! Alithos Anesti!

Romanian: Hristus A Inviat! Adeverat a Inviat!

Spanish: Cristo esta resucitado! En verdad, esta resucitado!
